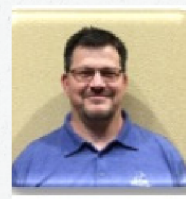

FINANCIAL SUMMARY 2021-22 AND 2022-23



For the full fiscal year completed May 31, 2022, Food Northwest finished with positive net revenue. For fiscal year 2022-23, the organization is projected to finish with positive net revenue.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Lead in Juice – Food Northwest submitted comments to FDA on its Draft Guidance Action Levels for Lead in Juice recommending that additional studies are needed to confirm that a more stringent standard is required. We also coordinated with the Juice Products Association.

WA Climate Commitment Act Program – Food Northwest participated in the rulemaking process and provided comments to the Department of Ecology. Our focus was to assure reasonable greenhouse gas emissions reduction obligations for food processors and other energy-intense trade-exposed EITE companies. While we were unable to convince Ecology to adopt our Best Available Technology approach to compliance, we have joined a coalition of companies in Washington and have convinced them to support our approach in the 2024 legislation that will set emissions reduction obligations for EITE companies for 2035 to 2050.

EPR in OR– Food Northwest served on the Plastic Pollution and Recycling Modernization Act (RMA) Rules Advisory Committee. The RMA establishes an Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) Program that will expand and upgrade recycling collection and processing. Brand owners will be responsible for paying for system -wide changes through fees on their consumer packaging. We worked to address concerns about fees, costs, system efficiencies, brand owner obligations, and implementation timing. A draft rule is expected to be released for public comment in May.

PFAS in Food Packaging -- PFAS (per- and polyfluoralkyl) substances in food packaging have become a major national issue. They are often found in paper-based food packaging to provide oil, grease, and water resistance. PFAS are referred to as “forever chemicals” because they are persistent and bioaccumulate; and they have been linked to several health concerns. Eleven states have enacted legislation banning food packaging with PFAS and nine states have bills before their legislatures this year. Food Northwest is tracking this issue and has prepared a briefing paper for the membership on PFAS that describes state prohibitions and recommends actions that food processors can take to protect themselves from liability.

Lower Umatilla Basin Water Issues – Nitrate levels in wells have been found to exceed EPA’s safe levels for drinking water. About 70% of the nitrate comes from irrigated agriculture. The Port of Morrow was fined \$2.1 million for excessive land application of wastewater containing nitrogen and several sources of wastewater came from food processors. A local coalition of businesses provided guidance and led by Boardman Food’s Debbie Radie was formed to address the issue. Food Northwest provided guidance and support to this effort and coordinated communication with legislators, lobbyists and Port businesses. .

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

USDOE Regional Hydrogen Hubs – The US Department of Energy will provide \$8 billion to establish up to 10 regional hydrogen hubs to accelerate the use of hydrogen. Food Northwest submitted a response to the Pacific Northwest Hydrogen Association's (PNHA) request for information to assist in its application to DOE. Food Northwest also met with PNHA and facilitated an informational webinar for Food Northwest members and opportunity for input on food processor involvement. PNHA's concept paper was accepted by DOE, and they have been invited to submit a plan.

Renewable Natural Gas Conference – Food Northwest partnered with the Northwest Alliance for Clean Transportation on a conference on the use of renewable natural gas in food processing and in transportation. The conference was held in Pasco, Washington and drew many food processors from the three Northwest states.

GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS

OR Food Processing Equipment Property Tax Exemption – Introduced this bill to extend the OR equipment property tax exemption which expires in 2025. We were successful in getting this line item into the Governor's proposed budget and expect to be successful in getting this passed.

WA B&O Exemption for fruit, vegetable, dairy and seafood processors for out of state sales. Two companion bills drafted and introduced that will extend the business and occupation tax exemption expiration date from 2025 to 2035. Both bills are strongly supported by both Democrats and Republicans. We expect these bills to pass with minimum opposition.

WA Extended Producer Responsibility Legislation to establish an extended producer responsibility program (EPR) that would have brand owners pay for the collection and recycling of their consumer packaging failed to pass. We strongly opposed this bill and provided several amendments. In response to failure, the legislature included in their budgets funding for a third-party contractor to conduct a study and recommend a design and implementation for an EPR program. We will participate in the study review and continue to work with national players like AMERIPEN to influence legislation for 2024.



WA Ban on Inks and Pigments with PCBs – bill to prohibit the manufacture, sale, distribution and use of inks and paints with chlorine-based pigments. This would impact food processor and other's packaging and labeling. Requires the state to petition EPA to change its regulations so state regulation would not be pre-empted. We are actively working to defeat or modify this bill.

OR Renewable Diesel Mandate/Petroleum Diesel Ban – This bill would have banned petroleum diesel in favor of renewable diesel. We do not oppose renewable diesel, but there is not sufficient supply to meet demand. We were able to defeat the mandate but there will likely be interim discussions.

OR Combined Animal Feeding Operations Limitations – one bill sought to put a 5-year moratorium on new or expansion of CAFOs, while another would impose additional regulations and cap the stock water exemption. We worked with legislators, the Governor's office, state agencies, and environmental interests to create reasonable regulations that will not reduce critical inputs for processors.

OR Renewable Diesel Mandate/Petroleum Diesel Ban – This bill would have banned petroleum diesel in favor of renewable diesel. We do not oppose renewable diesel, but there is not sufficient supply to meet demand. We were able to defeat the mandate but there will likely be interim discussions about how to expand the availability of renewable diesel in Oregon.

WA Transition to Clean Energy – Provides a pathway for Puget Sound Energy to discontinue new retail natural gas service beginning in July 2023 and to receive favorable rate treatment to move from natural gas to electricity. While manufacturers are exempt from the new service ban, costs for PSE's transition away from natural gas would fall on ratepayers. Food Northwest strongly opposed this bill and worked to help coordinate the broader business community opposition, which helped defeat this bill.

ID Workforce development/Idaho Launch – After several challenges, legislation passed to expand the Idaho Launch program that makes grants available (the lessor of \$8,000 or 80% of tuition and fees) for technical programs, training certificates, of community college programs, and includes an Opportunity Scholarship for universities and academic degrees. Food Northwest worked to secure passage of this legislation, which is part of the Governor's program to attract and retain skilled workers and provide more opportunities to Idahoans.

WA and OR Warehouse Productivity Standards – Limits certain kinds of productivity measures, prohibits quotas from interfering with meals and breaks, and health and safety. Food Northwest led the effort to exempt farm product warehousing and refrigerated warehousing and storage. In response to push back on the refrigerated warehousing and storage exemption, we crafted a narrow exemption for our cold storage suppliers.
